

Success in literacy is a strong determinant of student success in academics. Bearing this in mind, the English teachers have been working on different aspects of literacy. In order to gauge student areas of weakness, PAT tests have been conducted and teachers are working on vocabulary development and writing skills to develop effective writing skills.

It is important to ensure uniformity in marking against the rubrics set for students to ensure a standardised result. In order achieve this goal, the English Department teachers met in week 3 to engage in moderated assessment of student work. This was a highly productive exercise generating some important questions which made us all explore the minutiae of the standards that students perform to. We will be continuing with these exercises in the future.

We were also very fortunate to have a full-day workshop to implement the 7 Steps of Writing programme in our school. This will help develop cohesion across the teaching and shared language across different levels in school regarding how to approach the teaching of writing. The strategies shared will inshaAllah enable student competence and success.

Next term, the students will be undertaking Brightpath assessments to gauge their writing skills. I look forward to continuing working with you to enhance the educational outcomes for the students. If you have any questions or concerns, please do not hesitate to contact me.

CAREER COUNSELLOR AND VET COORDINATOR

Assalamu Alaikum Dear Parents and Caregivers

The new year brings multiple opportunities to learn about careers for the students. As in the previous years, we have continued our engagement with Flinders University through the River Journey presentations for Years 7–10. We had representatives come in to conduct activities with students relating to setting objectives, time management, stress management, motivation, self-care, setting a study timetable and exploring future study opportunities. I hope that it will help them develop good habits and set goals, which will be helpful to them in both their personal and professional life.

I am continuing to work one-to-one with year 12 students to keep mapping their preferences and provide them with options of courses most suited to their interests and career-based aspirations. In some cases, students need support with pathways that can lead them to courses of their choice. I have been making sure that students are familiar with these pathways and meet their pre-requisites.

Allied health has been one of the most popular areas that our students have sought admissions to in the last three years. This term in week 7, a faculty member from the department of Allied Health at Flinders University gave students a talk about what different aspects of Allied Health involved, the work possibilities and the requirements to undertake these courses.

As regards VET, this year we have a total of 10 students enrolled in different courses. All of these students are pursuing Certificate 3's. These have an additional benefit as not only do they provide a pathway to work but can also assist the students in meeting their ATAR requirements. I also conducted a VET session with the Year 10 students to inform them about what VET entails. This will enable them to make suitable choices in Year 10 so that they can complete their courses in Year 11.

Dear Parents and Caregivers,

As-Salam-u-Alaikum

Welcome to Term 1, 2025. We want to take this opportunity to wish you all EID MUBARAK in advance. We have had a wonderful start to our first year of primary school and have enjoyed getting to know each other through interactions and planned meetings. These learning opportunities have been imperative to building positive, reciprocal relationships, both within the classroom and the wider school community. We have been busy establishing routines and expectations within the classroom and familiarizing ourselves with the school environments and facilities, such as the canteen, playground, library, office, and water fountains.

Our learning journey towards the curriculum is as follows:

English: We are enjoying the jolly phonics program and the songs and actions associated. We are proud to say we have learnt with ease the sounds of letters and diagraphs up to "ng". We have been practising letter formation of all these letters, doing our very best to form our letters within the lines. Students have been exposed to various literacy texts in the library and class with a focus on looking at the book covers and characters.

Maths: In Math, our focus was on identifying numerals 0 to 10, using proper mathematical vocabulary (representing, associating, value, number name), positional language, sorting and categorizing data, ordinals numbers 1–5, and describing attributes such as long/short, big/small, few/many.

Science: We have explored the External Features of Animals in science. Students have been engaged and involved in observing, describing, and classifying animals based on their external features.

Hass, Arts, Digital Technologies

The concept of All about Myself and family was explored as a part of learning in HASS. In Art students have been primarily practising their fine motor skills through art activities involving cutting, pasting, gluing, painting, and drawing. They created several artifacts relating to RAMADAN for class display. They learnt various types of lines and created their pattern using doodle art. Students have been exploring the concepts of hardware, software and peripheral devices in digital technologies.

Finally, to celebrate some of our foundation students participated in The Ramadan Art Competition and it was a privilege to have The Hon. Mira El Dannawi MLC visit our classroom and have a chat with our young learners.










Assalamu Alaikum!

Mathematics

This term included problem solving strategies and word problems based on all four operations. We have been estimating, ordering and comparing numbers up to 100,000.















Year 5 students have undertaken NAPLAN testing. They have worked very hard to prepare for this and we have been impressed by the extra work they also have been doing at home. Thank you to our parents for this. Lexile testing has continued this year. We strongly urge you to ensure your child is reading each night for 30 minutes with a book at your child's instructional level (50 to 100 points above their Lexile).

With Ramadan happening this term, the students have enjoyed creating Ramadan and Eid art. The classrooms look great!






































ISLAMIC STUDIES FOR PRIMARY SCHOOL

In addition to reading comprehension and sentence construction activities, students examined the singular, dual, plural nouns in Arabic and compared them to their counterparts in English. They conjugated the present tense verb with the third person pronouns and the past tense verb with all pronoun groups. The students will be experimenting with writing their own narratives.








Caption: Little Red Riding Hood and the wolf, present well-established stereotypes like the innocent protagonist, and the savage, evil creature.

This term, our Year 11 Photography students are focusing on mastering **camera techniques** and **Photoshop editing skills** to enhance their photography work.


Key Learning Areas:
